

The meeting was called to order by President Steven Douglass at 7:15. (Lots of Visiting!)

The program for the evening was show and tell. Pam Lander brought a selection of polished seam agates that looked good enough to eat! Kirk & Tabatha brought a box of items they collected on their 2 ½ months of traveling south last winter which included jaspers, agates, and petrified wood. Ron Payne brought samples of Plume Jasper from Jasper Point, OR and told a great story of collecting them. R John Montgomery brought finds from Westport, WA including concretions and beach rocks. Pat Russell brought a piece of rhyolite that had a lacy green stripe and a sphere shape that made it look like a beach scene. Steve Douglass brought a large plate of pyrite pieces that came from the Spruce Claim on Snoqualmie Pass which is private. He also told of taking Christy and Hiram Beach to Dry Gulch to find fossils. They spent most of the day; gathered a lot but neglected to tell Steve that after sliding down the hill he wore a large hole in his jeans! Chuck Watkins brought 2 wonderful specimens he found on Red Top. One was a 6" by 10" (my guess) bowl shaped piece of geode with amethyst crystals and the other a big piece of solid geode. He also brought a large aerial map of the Red Top area which may show up on the shop wall. Marcia Summers brought a piece of Labradorite which she purchased in Whitefish, MT, a jar of recently polished material, and samples of rocks found in the Yellow Stone River.

The minutes were not read.

Blue Zircon – Birthstone for December – Modern List

Zircon is a natural gemstone. Cubic zircon is a cheap, synthetic diamond substitute that resembles colorless zircon. Zircons come in many colors but blue is the most highly prized. They are first mentioned in the ancient tale of the Kalpa Tree. Described by Hindu poets as the ultimate gift to the gods, it was a bright, glowing tree with leaves covered in zircon. Jewish legends say zircon was the

name of the angel sent to watch over Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. Cambodia is the world's largest producer of blue zircon. Zircon is also mined in Australia, India, Brazil, and the United States.

Tanzanite & Blue Topaz – Birthstone for December – Modern List

Both of these gemstones come out of the ground mostly colorless and require heat treatments and/or radiation to achieve a blue color. They are relatively inexpensive alternatives to more expensive Zircon. Tanzanite comes from Tanzania. Topaz is mined in Brazil, the United States, Madagascar, Myanmar, Namibia, Zimbabwe, Mexico and many other counties around the earth.

Turquoise – Birthstone for December – Traditional List

Since ancient times, turquoise has been known for its distinct color. It is one of the few minerals who's name is also a color. Due to its relative softness, artisans around the world found it to be a good medium for carving into shapes for jewelry, ceremonial masks, and talismans. King Tut's burial mask and tomb were inlaid with turquoise. American Indians have long been known for their

excellent work with turquoise and silver. Most turquoise is between 4 and 5 on the Mohs scale although some found in the southwest part of the United States measures 6 or above on the scale. Turquoise is found in many parts of the world but the Unites States and Mexico are now the largest producers with the state of Arizona leading by value and quality.
