Member news


Christi and Hiram Beach sent in this report about their adventures to the other side of the continent.

"My husband and I just got back from Florida. We found fossilized shark teeth and a fossilized dugong rib bone fragment along the Peace River, and a bunch of fossilized coral in the Tampa area. We had to ship the fossilized coral to ourselves, because we found more than could fit in our luggage!

We were there for 6 days, and drove over 900 miles trying out different locations, and discovered that most of the rivers were running too high and fast to safely hound. A few months from now, the rivers will drop by 10+ feet and it will be safer and easier. The last 2 days of our trip, however, some locals shared their winter hounding locations with us, and that's where we finally had success. Those first few days, though, were significant reminders to enjoy the immense beauty of the world around us, whether or not we found a rock or fossil worth


carrying home.

Overall it was a fantastic adventure, and we look forward to going back for more!"




The Rockhound Challenge

Sheila Danielson passed along this information from the Columbia Basin Herald for any of you interested in the geologic features and structures around our Valley.

"The Wenatchee Valley Erratics, Ice Age Floods Institute will host a talk Feb. 14 on the Wenatchee Pinnacles, according to a statement from the organization. The speaker will be Dr. Ralph Dawes, an earth sciences professor at Wenatchee Valley College, who will discuss volcanic activity in the Wenatchee area. The Wenatchee Pinnacles are volcanic rock protrusions on the hillsides west of Wenatchee, including Saddle Rock, Castle Rock, Old Butte, the Wenatchee Dome and Rooster Comb. Over a century of controversy continues over their rock types, ages, origins, their role in the gold deposits in the Wenatchee Gold Belt mining district and tectonic history of the area, according to the statement.

The program will begin at 7 p.m. at the Wenatchee Valley Museum and Cultural Center, 127 S. Mission Street. Attendees are asked to wear a mask. The program will also be available via Zoom at https://us02web.zoom.us/j/84520197937. Both the in-person and online presentations are free and open to the public.
