

Meet Your Fellow Club Members Sarah Collomore



Sarah Collamore grew up in the picturesque town of Gig Harbor where boats come and go and riding the ferry is a common mode of transportation. Puget Sound provides postcard worthy views while storms formed offshore bring rain to keep everything green and lush. It seems like an idyllic place to me.

Sarah's father grew up in the Upper Wenatchee Valley. As a result, she spent a lot of time in her younger years, on the east side of the Cascades. In the late spring and summer, there was whitewater rafting on the Wenatchee River. In the winter, it was ice fishing up at Fish Lake. There was also camping, lots of camping. Sarah loved it all.

In case you haven't already surmised it, Sarah is an outdoor person. That's certainly not a unique trait amongst members of our club. I think most of us are lovers of the outdoors, maybe we all are. Sarah took it one step further however and decided to make a career of it by studying tourism and outdoor recreation while attending college in

Central Oregon. She also studied geology, which comes in handy.

She likes to travel to different places and experience new things. Over the years, in addition to Washington and Oregon, she has lived in Colorado, Utah, Hawaii, Montana, Alaska, and Spain. She told me she has rocks from all over the world.

North Central Washington must have been whispering in her ear because four and a half years ago Sarah returned to her home state. About a year and a half later she took a job with the Washington State Park Service. Her first position was at Wenatchee Confluence, shortly later she moved to Lincoln Rock where she now works as a Senior Park Aid which is one step below Park Ranger. She loves her job. I think the fact that she gets to spend so much time outdoors has something to do with it.

Sarah told me that she had been thinking about joining a rock club because she wanted to meet more people who shared her interest, learn more about rocks and minerals and to participate in field trips. Kirk Laird presented a program on fluorescent minerals and phosphorescence. He talked about different wavelengths of UV light and showed photos of various minerals fluorescing. He also showed pictures of caves at Sterling Hill Mine in New Jersey where the walls have fluorescent minerals in green, blue, and orange.

He brought a box he had made with a 254-nanometer UV light placed inside and a viewing hole in the top where club members were able to see specimens of the following minerals fluorescing: Willemite (bright green), Calcite with impurities (gray), Wollastonite (yellow), and Scheelite (blue white).
