Kirk Laird

Kirk Laird is the consummate traveler. He has visited all 50 states and has been to 45 countries. Venturing to so many places has afforded him the opportunity to amass a collection of over 300 types of minerals and gemstones, many of which represent the places he has visited.

Kirk attended the University of Washington where he took geology classes which expanded his interest in minerals that began at age 18. It was there that he took a geology class which opened his eyes to the beauty and wonder of minerals. A class on geologic mapping took place near Leavenworth in 1978. There, he learned of the soapstone and actinolite deposits near Lake Wenatchee and found calcite crystals north of Leavenworth up Eagle Creek. His geology studies confirmed a love of minerals that has spanned more than 50 years.

In addition to travelling, Kirk has also lived in a variety of places. While serving in the Navy, he lived in Spain where he collected mercury at a mine site that was first put into production by the Romans over 2000 years ago.

He lived in Elko, Nevada where he went to an underground mine that passed through caverns that were lined with Golden Barite. At Garnet Hill near Ely, Nevada, he collected semiprecious stones. While living in Texas he found clam and coral fossils. In Utah, he found some awesome trilobite fossils and topaz crystals.

Kirk worked for the Bureau of Land Management in Nevada for 21 years where one of his chief duties was to conduct environmental impact studies when a gold mine wanted to expand. Working with gold mines sounds like a tough gig for a rockhound.

Drawn by his interest in minerals, Kirk first joined the Ginkgo Mineral Society in 1989. When he moved out of state, of course, he let his membership lapse. Following his retirement, he relocated to Derby Canyon in Peshastin in 2013 and he rejoined the club. He is an active member whose knowledge of mineralogy is greatly appreciated. He said that he has only dabbled in lapidary, but he could see himself getting more interested if he could make more time for it.

Kirk is an emerging author. He said that he recently completed a book titled Radical Pragmatism that he has been working on for several years. He recently had it self-published to give to friends and family.

I will conclude this story by sharing with you what Kirk told me when I asked him what inspired him to travel around the globe. His answer was, "It's an awesome world. You learn something from everywhere you go. People everywhere are pretty much the same. It's their cultures that are different."

From the Scribe

Program: Thea Stender presented a program about Washington Coast fossils. She highlighted a part of the Olympic Peninsula near Port Angeles where Twin Beach and Murdock Beach are situated about 10 minutes apart with the goal of taking a field trip there.

Thea showed slides of marine fossils that can be found in the Pysht Formation in Clallam County from the late Oligocene to early Miocene. Fossils that were shown included, *Callinopsis Clallamensis* (ghost shrimp claws), *Lacuna Hannibali* clams, *Lirracassis* (sea snail). *Soleyma Dalli* clams, *Tarritalla* concretions, agatized snail shells, and agatized *Nautilus* (a cousin to cuttlefish).

Thea is suggesting a trip to both Twin and Murdock beaches later this summer, perhaps in August. She said that it is about a 5 ½ hour drive from Wenatchee to get there and that participants can stay at the Twin Beach Campground. Refreshments: Club provided pizza. Thea brought drinks

Brenda Jackson brought ammonite, trilobite, snail, and Dry Gulch fossils.

Dereck Corder showed miscellaneous labeled fossils.

Bob Grant displayed polished agates and a large piece of rose quartz that he got while he and Peggy were in Phoenix. He also told a hilarious story about going through security at the airport where the TSA agents were trying to figure out what he had in his bag. Surprise! It was a big ole rock.
