Did you know

A **Tektite** is a rare natural glass formed when an asteroid strikes the Earth. **Tektites can** be found in at least five widely separated locations on the Earth. Not everything about how the glass **forms** is fully understood adding to the charm and mystery of this rare material. The most famous possible tektites are known as "Agni Gemma" (or Agni Mani). They are the fabled "fire pearls" of ancient myth and legend. One was given to Queen Elizabeth II on her wedding day for good luck by Baron Richard de Touche Skadding, a French nobleman and explorer. He discovered a quantity of Agni Gemma while shipwrecked on Billiton Island in the Java Sea. Rich black in color with a dark olive green tinge along the outer



edges, the Agni Gemma is distinguished from all other meteoric stones by the natural etching on its surface and by its composition and weight. They have an extremely high melting point – at least 3,100 degrees Fahrenheit. A typical price for a 1 centimeter cube of this material is about \$100. The common name for these stones is Javanite.
