What's Cookin' Part 2 By Dan Hanson

Last month I talked about baking rocks in the oven to change their color. This month I'm going to talk about baking rocks in an oven to make them harder.

Many of you went on the field trip last summer to gather Noble Serpentine. I didn't make the trip but thanks to the generosity of Pam Lander and Gregg Stanford, I ended up with a nice collection of specimens that looked suitable for slabbing. Unfortunately when I went to cut some slabs at the shop, many of the slabs fractured and crumbled. While visiting Susan Olgebay, she showed me some stabilized rocks that had been soaked in a concoction of acetone and epoxy. About the same time Gregg and I were headed south to our winter houses and the Happy Trails Lapidary Club. After some research online, we convinced the club there to purchase a vacuum pump and some Cactus Juice resin. Here is the process we developed for the Noble Serpentine and other soft stones.

Thoroughly clean slabs or rocks in acetone. Place stones in a container and cover with Cactus Juice. Use the vacuum pump to remove the air inside the rocks. Amazingly it takes several hours to get all the air out of the rocks. Take the container of rocks and Cactus Juice out of the vacuum and set aside for

twice as many hours to let atmospheric pressure push the resin back into the rocks. After the rocks have absorbed the resin, they need to be baked. Take the rocks out of the container and place on toaster oven rack. Bake at 250 degrees for 3-4 hours. Do this OUTSIDE so the smoke doesn't set off the fire alarms!

We've been able to slice all the pieces of Noble Serpentine we brought with us and many other soft rocks this winter using this process. The piece at the right is some of that rock set in a pendant setting generously given to me by Susan Olgebay. The pendant does look much better in person.
