
ROGER, THE ROCKHOUND SEZ:

"Rockhunting Montana" has been donated to the library by Craig Garver and Barbara. Had two copies, so we received the extra.



THE LEGEND OF THE SAND DOLLAR

The Holy Shell, otherwise known as the Sand Dollar, is one of nature's most unusual specimens of marine life. The markings on the shell symbolize the birth and crucifixion and resurrection of Christ. An outline of the Easter Lily is a five pointed star that represents the Star of Bethlehem. The narrow elliptical openings are reminiscent of the five wounds made in the body of Christ during the crucifixion.

On the underside of the shell is an easily recognized outline of the Christmas Poinsettia. When the shell is broken open, cells are found, each holding five objects that look like birds in flight. These represent the Dove of Peace. Another interpretation of these bird-like objects connects them to the angels who sang to the shepherds on the first Christmas morning.

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IS IT HARD OR TOUGH?

The terms "hardness" and "toughness" are sometimes confused when comparing qualities of gemstones – and there is a great deal of difference.

The Diamond is far and away the hardest – for it will scratch, cut or polish any other stone. As an example, with a diamond-pointed wheel dresser, as is used by lapidary workers, silicon carbide grinding wheels could be reduced to dust in minutes.

But for toughness (resistance to chipping and breaking) – jade has it beat by a country mile. A diamond will scratch and easily cut jade, but a jade hammer can crush a diamond to powder. It is the cross-matted structure of jade that makes it nearly impossible to break.

Never fear if you accidentally drop a solid jade cabochon on cement. If it breaks, better check it, it is probably not jade. The Chinese used jade for anvils just as we use steel. Sometimes, the same anvil was used for several generations. Jade used for axes and hammer-like tools centuries ago was a practical, useful and highly valued material. GOLD – FRANKINCENSE – and MYRRH

Of the Christmas phrase, gold is familiar to us, but what about the other two?

Frankincense comes from the resin of a desert tree, Boswellia Curteril, found in arid parts of Arabia, Somalia and India. Scientists believe that the tree was imported into Israel, and its fragrance cultivated near the Dead Sea in the royal gardens of Judea.

Myrrh was more common in ancient Israel, but an expensive item, none-the-less; it too, comes from a tree, Commoniphora Myrra, which is native to Arabia, Ethiopia and Somalia.

Myrrh was pulverized and then used as an important ingredient in holy ointments. The wealthy also wore small bags of myrrh around their necks carrying the fragrance with them.
